

Probate of \$200,000 Will Is Set Aside

The \$200,000 will of Mrs. Mattie Rae, widow of Clark Rae, former superintendent of the shops of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company, will be contested, it was indicated Saturday, when Harry L. Hargadon, attorney for five brothers and sisters of Mrs. Rae, had Judge Ben F. Ewing set aside the probating of the document.

Judge Ewing declared the probating "null and void" when Hargadon told him that Mrs. Rae died March 27, while a resident of Shepherdsville, Bullitt County. His contention that the will should have been filed there was upheld by Judge Ewing.

Under provisions of the will, which disposed of an estate valued at \$200,000, Dr. W. S. Napper, Bardstown, a brother, and Mrs. Nellie Monley, Nicholasville, a sister, were left \$2,000 in trust. Two other brothers, Sherman and Frank Napper, St. Petersburg, Fla., were left \$1,000 in trust, and another sister, Mrs. Anna Ashwell, Shepherdsville, was not provided for. The remainder of the estate was left, according to the will, to be divided between Masonic charitable institutions.
